Victim-Defined Advocacy

- 6
- □ Ask what the victim wants
- □ Recognize the impact of trauma
- □ Promote self-determination to restore control to the victim
- □ Provide resources to support victim decisions
- □ Advocate to support victim
- □ Recognize the strength and resiliency of survivor

Practice Respectful Communication

- □ Determine survivors communication needs and style
- □ Allow more time
- □ Listen to what a victim may need now; be prepared for needs and goals to change over time
- □ Identify safety concerns
- □ Respect cultural and generational values

- □ Listen
- $\hfill\Box$ Reflect statements and feelings
- □ Validate fear and safety concerns
- □ Honor instincts
- □ Continue to listen and learn
