



#### Substitute Decision-making

- - ☐ Health Care Power of Attorney
  - □ Durable Power of Attorney for Finances
  - □ Guardianship/conservatorship
  - □ Supported Decision-Making

| Commonly used terms                           |   |
|---|---|
| Proxy   | A person, or a written document, with the authority to represent someone else |
| Agent   | A person who acts on behalf of another person                                 |
| Principal                                     | The person who has designated someone else to act on their behalf             |
| Ward  | A person who is subject to guardianship                                       |

#### Health Care Powers of Attorney

Written document naming another person (the "agent" or "proxy") to make decisions about health care:

- □ Anybody principal chooses
- □ Starts immediately or upon incapacity
- ☐ Can include mental health decisions
- ☐ As broad or as limited in scope as principal desires

#### Health Care Power of Attorney (Slide 1)

#### **Benefits**

- □ Principal can direct their own medical treatment
- □ Decision-maker the principal *wants;* can even designate future guardian
- □ Family and doctors will know in advance what principal wants done
- □ Revocable (if competent)

#### Health Care Power of Attorney (Slide 2)

#### **Risks**

- □ A significant amount of power to agent, especially if principal is or is perceived to be limited in capacity
- □ Safety measures exist but are hard to monitor and enforce
- $\hfill\square$  Essentially a license to exert power and control

#### **Durable Power of Attorney for Finances**

Written document naming another person (the "agent" or "proxy") to manage legal and financial affairs:

- □ Anyone principal chooses
- □ Starts immediately or upon incapacity
- ☐ As broad or limited in scope as principal desires
- □ "Durable" = lasts beyond incapacity

#### Powers of the Agent (Slide 1)

- □ Spend principal's money
- □ Cash checks
- □ Withdraw money from principal's accounts
- □ Acquire assets on the principal's behalf
- □ Apply for credit

# Powers of the Agent (Slide 2) Sell property Enter contracts Incur debt Pursue insurance claims and legal actions

# Limitations on Agent (Slide 1) | Must keep money separate | Must not stand to profit from any transaction | Must keep records and provide accounting upon request

#### Limitations on Agent (Slide 2)

15

- □ Cannot make gifts of principal's assets to themselves or anyone else—unless POA states otherwise
- □ Any other limitations principal chooses

#### **POA Safety Measures**

16

POAs are always revocable (if competent):

- □ "I revoke the authority of \_\_\_\_ to act as my agent pursuant to any and all POAs I have given prior to this date"
- □ Sign, date and notarize
- □ Publicize distribute to banks, responsible family members, attorney, etc.

#### Benefits of Financial POAs

17

- □ Principal can direct their own legal/financial affairs
- □ Decision-maker the principal *wants*
- □ Prompts discussion and dissemination of information

#### Benefits & Risks of Financial POAs

- □ A *huge* amount of power to agent
- □ Essentially a license to exert power and control
- □ Safety measures exist but are hard to monitor and enforce

#### What Happens Without a Financial POA?

- □ In an emergency, bills may not get paid
- □ A court may step in and appoint a guardian and/or conservator
  - □ Much more significant loss of independence
  - □ Lose all legal ability to make decisions
  - ☐ May not be someone principal chooses

# Guardianship and Conservatorship

#### Guardianship: "Incapacitated Person"

Any person impaired by reason of illness or incapacity to the extent that they lack the ability to make or communicate responsible decisions

#### Powers of a Guardian

23

- □ Same powers, rights and duties as parent to child (except liability to third parties)
  - □ Establish placement
  - □ Possession of personal property
  - □ Decisions re: medical care, treatment, services
  - □ Financial authority if no conservator
- □ Limited guardianship is sometimes an option

#### Guardianship (Slide 1)

#### **Benefits**

A capable, well-intentioned guardian can:

- □ Protect an incapacitated victim from future harm by perpetrator
- $\hfill \square$  Pursue perpetrator accountability on victim's behalf

#### Guardianship (Slide 2)

#### **Risks**

- □ Establishing legal incapacity is a serious deprivation of autonomy, and difficult to reverse
  - □ A *huge* amount of power to agent
  - □ Essentially a license to exert power and control
  - □ Safety measures exist but are hard to monitor and enforce

#### POA vs. Guardianship

26

#### **POA**

- □ Principal retains legal authority
- □ Agent must do as principal wishes—regardless of principal's best interest
- □ No substituted judgment

#### **Guardianship**

- □ Ward has no legal authority
- □ Guardian must act in ward's best interest—ward's wishes are only advisory
- Requires substituted judgment

#### Signs of Abuse by Agent or Guardian

27

- Bills are not being paid; needed services are not being provided
- □ Guardian or agent can not or will not document expenditures or provide an accounting of the ward or principal's assets
- □ A health care agent appears to be making decisions that are known to be counter to the principal's wishes
- □ A guardian is making decisions that are not in the best interest of the ward
- □ A ward or principal exhibits other signs of abuse or neglect

#### Supported Decision-making

28

- □ Guardianship alternative
- □ Respects ability
- □ Preserves autonomy
- □ Improves quality of life
- □ Availability varies from state to state

- □ Courthouse staff (often probate court)
- □ Aging network staff
- **APS**
- □ Legal services providers
- □ County or state Human Services/Department on Aging staff
- □ Local CCR/FAST team

#### Summary

30

- □ Powers of Attorney, Guardianships, and Conservatorships can be beneficial for individuals who want or need a substitute decision-maker.
- □ These instruments may, however, facilitate abuse and exploitation if decision-making authority is granted to the wrong party.
- □ Before there is an emergency need for them, identify local procedures/resources to address or prevent abuse by substitute decision-makers.
