This early interest in reptiles and amphibians led me to the University of North Carolina Asheville where I pursued a degree in ecology and environmental biology. After graduating with a bachelor's degree, I worked briefly as an environmental educator before applying and being accepted as the Panamanian golden frog keeper at the Maryland Zoo. This is where I was first introduced to AAZK and attended the annual conference in 2006. After two years at the Maryland Zoo I decided to move forward with my career and accepted a job in the Herpetology department at the Bronx Zoo in 2008. Here I became the founding treasurer of Bronx Zoo's AAZK Chapter. At this time I also began taking courses in animal behavior at Hunter University.

In 2011 I decided to pursue my education more seriously and looked into other opportunities. After learning about the relationship between the Smithsonian and George Mason University I applied for a position at the Reptile Discovery Center at the National Zoo. Once accepted I applied for graduate admissions at GMU and I was recently accepted into George Mason's conservation science and policy masters program and will begin classes this fall. I am a member of the turtle and tortoise propagation group(TTPG), the turtle survival alliance(TSA), the society for the study of amphibians and reptiles(SSAR) and several other herpetological organizations. I currently hold the studbook for *Cuora galbinifrons*, *bouretti* and *picturata* and hope to conduct my graduate research on these species. I am a co-chair of the National Capitals AAZK Chapter social committee.

I am currently the President of the American Association of Zoo Keepers and have been a Board Member since 2007. I have been an active member of the Association since 1995, serving 13 years on the San Diego Chapter Board of Directors. I am currently Board Oversight for Professional Development.

I worked as a research technician for the Hawaii Institute of Marine Biology during the early 80's. I assisted with construction and population management of artificial reefs, various aquaculture and mariculture projects, and water quality analysis. My experience in water chemistry took me on a number of research cruises in the French Frigate Shoals and south of the Equator.

I have been a zookeeper with the Zoological Society of San Diego since 1993. I am currently an Animal Care Supervisor in the Collections, Husbandry, Science Department, mammals division. I have been both Lead Keeper and Supervisor of San Diego Zoo's Children's Zoo and prior to that; I was a Senior Hospital Keeper with Veterinary

Services where I worked for over 9 years. As a hospital keeper, I worked with practically every species that is represented at the San Diego Zoo. This working knowledge included, being able to clean, feed, house, capture and restrain, train, and provide enrichment for any animal that stayed at the veterinary hospital. Previous to working at the hospital, I was a mammal keeper for four years, working primarily with primates and carnivores.

Field work experience includes Lumholtz Tree Kangaroo Project 2000 (Australia) and Female Black Bear Reproductive Project 2004-2006 (South Dakota). In 2009, I traveled to Indonesia as a representative of AAZK, assessing the impact of Rhino Protection Units in Java and Sumatra.

I have been a volunteer with the California Wolf Center since 2004. The California Wolf Center is an active participant in the Mexican wolf SSP breeding program. In May 2005, I became a member of the Board of Directors. As an Executive Board Member, I am responsible for animal transfers, volunteer coordination, food acquisition, administrative help, education, and research and internships. I also help organize and instruct our annual Chemical Immobilization and Restraint course designed for wildlife professionals. I am currently co-chair of the Wolf Center's future planning committee.

I am currently on the University of San Diego's Institutional Animal Care and Use Committee (IACUC).

I later moved up to the incubation keeper and later still to relief keeper. I also helped implement psitticine training during my employment.
