AAZK Membership Levels¹

Professional

Full time animal keepers including retired full time animal keepers. Part time animal keepers including part time retired animal keepers (Part-time animal keeper defined in bullet below). Includes aquarists, veterinary, or research technicians.

- As defined in section 3.01-130 of the AAZK Operations Manual, a part time professional animal keeper is defined as a permanent, part-time professional member as a monetarily-compensated position in a recognized zoo, aquarium or related animal care facility as an individual who works a minimum of twenty (20) hours per week and less than forty (40) hours per week in the animal care professional field as a zoo (animal) keeper, aquarist, veterinary or research technician and other personnel directly connected with the display, care and feeding of captive exotic animals and who is recognized by their USDA licensed, aviary or reptile facility as a "part-time" zoo keeper, or animal care staff member. Part-time, for purpose of this Directive shall not refer to seasonal employees.

Affiliate

Staff (curators, supervisors, commissary, etc), docents, volunteers and supporters of the animal care profession.

Student

Student (may be requested to provide student identification)



Resources/Publications

AAZK is a resource which can help keepers stay up to date with new techniques, trends, and other resources regarding animal care and welfare.

The Animal Keepers' Forum (AKF)

The Animal Keepers' Forum is a monthly publication that has been produced by AAZK since 1975. The AKF has included articles on behavioral husbandry, enrichment, diets, exhibit designs, animal introductions, reproduction, and so much more. There are also advertisements from companies that specifically work with zoos and aquariums for food, enclosures, equipment, etc. As of June 2018, articles published in the AKF can now be referenced digitally through an open access partnership with the Smithsonian Biodiversity Heritage Library (BHL).

Conference Proceedings

Proceedings from past conferences are available on the AAZK website. Proceedings include subject material covered and contact information for sources.

Animal Data Transfer Form (ADT)

The Animal Data Transfer form (ADT) was created by AAZK in 1979 as a tool for keeper to keeper communication when it came to transferring animals between facilities. The form is not meant to replace the animals' detailed health and management records, but instead create a quick reference with the information that keepers have a tendency to find the most beneficial. The ADT has been highly encouraged by a majority of facilities to be included with all animal transfers since its creation.

Conservation

AAZK also has longstanding conservation partnerships. Over AAZK's lifetime, over \$7 million dollars has been raised through Bowling for Rhinos events. These funds have gone to animal and habitat conservation in Africa and Indonesia (A BFR Milestone).
