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Keepin' it Real

What is a Quadratic Function?	The Conceptualizer!
Quadratic functions are polynomial functions to the second degree. They can be written in the form $f(x) = ax^2 + bx + c$.	
When graphed they create parabolas that are noted for their "u-shape". The base of the quadratic function is known as the <i>vertex</i> which will be the maximum or minimum of the function.	

Key Concept (b)

Solving Quadratic Equations by Factoring	The Conceptualizer!
Knowing how <i>factoring</i> works help us solve quadratic equations.	
If we can factor the quadratic equation in the form of $(x+a)(x+b)=0$, the equation is almost solved! This is because when	
(x+a)(x+b) = 0, (x+a) = 0 or (x+b) = 0.	
Then we can solve the equation for the two cases separately. These equations reveal the roots of a quadratic function.

Solving Quadratic Equations with Square Roots	Details
In some cases, a quadratic expression will already be a perfect square on one side.	
If $x^2 = a$, then $x = \pm \sqrt{a}$

$(x-4)^2 = 10$	

Key Concept (d)

Solving Quadratic Equations In Vertex Form	Details
If the quadratic equation is in its <i>vertex form</i> , the square is already completed. We just need to do some additional algebra before we can solve with square roots.	
Here are the steps:	
 Isolate the square. Take the square root on both sides (remember to use the sign ± on the right hand side) Isolate x and simplify the solution. Sometimes it's more clear to leave it alone instead of getting decimals.

$-4(x-8)^2 - 3 = -11$	

Key Concept (e)

Completing the Square	Details
If an equation does not match the pattern of a perfect square or a factor by reverse FOIL, we can "complete the square".	
Completing the square makes the quadratic into a square by adding a proper constant based on the coefficient of the x-term (b) to make it match the form of a perfect square.	
The constant added to the quadratic is the square of half of the coefficient of the x-term, $\left(\frac{b}{2}\right)^2$.	
CAUTION: This method would only work if the coefficient of x^2 is 1. Otherwise, we need to change the coefficient to 1 before completing square. It will require division.	
NOTE: This is the same process used to convert a quadratic in standard form to a quadratic in vertex form.

Quadratic Formula	Details
If in doubt, we can solve any quadratic equation with the <i>quadratic formula</i> .	
$x = \frac{-b \pm \sqrt{b^2 - 4ac}}{2a}$	
where a, b and c are the coefficients and constant when the quadratic equation is in its standard form $ax^2 + bx + c = 0$.	
It works for any quadratic equation as long as it is in its standard form.	
It just may not be the fastest in all cases. #slowbutsteady

#Observations

Unreal

In cases, where quadratics have no solution (meaning they do not have any real roots), it is most clearly seen in the quadratic formula because b^2-4ac will be negative.

Key Concept (g)

Graphs of Quadratic Equations	The Conceptualizer!
Graphs for quadratic equations are parabolas.	
We can tell the general look of the parabola from the general form of the quadratic equation $y = ax^2 + bx + c$.	
When a is positive, the parabola opens upward. When a is negative, the parabola opens downward.	
When $ a > 1$, the parabola will be "skinnier".	
When $ a < 1$ (meaning coefficient of x^2 is a fraction less than one), the parabola will be "fatter".

Key Concept (h)

Maximum and Minimums of Quadratic Functions	The Conceptualizer!
Parabolas are symmetrical. The vertex is the point where the parabola changes direction.	
The vertex is the maximum (for parabolas that open downward) and minimum (for parabola that open upward).	
We can identify the maximum and minimum two different ways:	
(1) when we are given a graph.(2) when we are given the equation in vertex form by identifying (h,k) and we consider the sign on the 'a' coefficient.	

Maximum and Minimums of Quadratic Functions	Notes
-1 -2 -3 -4	
$y = (x+1)^2 + 3$	

Key Concept (i)

Graphing Quadratic Equations	The Conceptualizer!
Graphing quadratic equations is similar to graphing linear equations. The only difference is the graph is not a straight line but a smooth parabola.	
First, we need to evaluate quadratic functions at specific values of x you pick.	
It might be easier to start off with the y-intercept (when $x = 0$) and remember to pick values of x so you can sketch both sides of the parabola.	
The more points you pick, the more detailed your graph will be.	
Then sketch a smooth curve!	
Double Checks: (1) should your parabola open up or down? (2) parabola is symmetric
