Summarization Extension Activity

After students use the elements of the plot to generate a basic summary, they can use it to develop a similar version without using the clue words: someone, wanted, but, so, then. Give students an opportunity to rewrite their summary without using the summary clue words.

Story Summary

Sample summary without using someone, wanted, but, so, then:

One day a mother leaves her three daughters to visit their grandmother. Before she leaves she instructs them to lock the doors after she is gone. A wolf disguises himself as an old woman—their supposed Lon Po Po. He tricks his way into the house only to have the oldest of the three sisters trick him with a tale about gingko nuts. She gets rid of the wolf forever.

 - B A mother leaves her three daughters to visit their grandmother warning them to lock the door when she leaves. Lon Po Po, the granny wolf, manages to trick her way into their home. The three little girls spare Lon Po Po no mercy when they tempt her up a tree and to her death.
