**Mentor Text for “Hooks” and “Parting Thoughts”**

**Instructional option for interactive writing:** Print and distribute to any groups assigned to write the introduction or closing paragraphs in collaborative writing. Students read and choose one hook to combine with the central idea. Alternate parting thoughts are also provided for groups assigned to write the closing paragraph. As always, students may add or change any words.

Hook or Lead Option #1 – Truism with pop culture Reference

Sometimes when you are a little kid, you may think as Superman or Batman as a hero. But real heroes can be seen every day.

Hook or Lead Option #2 – One-word fragments.

Brave. Strong. American. These are words that represent our military heroes.

Hook or Lead Option #3 – Insightful questions with an obvious answer.

Who can we ALL appreciate for their dedication and service? Who has a special holiday dedicated to their love of country? Our beloved Veterans!

Parting Thought #1 –

For the REAL heroes in our country, we should find any way we can to say, “Thank you! You are much appreciated!”

Parting Thought #2 –

Brave. Strong. American. These are words that represent our Veterans. It is a privilege to honor our everyday heroes.
