Sao Paolo brings the number of hosting continents to four; the first in the Southern Hemisphere. Under the fitting theme of "building bridges," the Sao Paolo EPIC has brought people and industries into new conversations and many of the companies they work with are listed on the just launched and increasingly global EPIC People Business Directory. Within weeks of this reading, proceedings containing all papers and Pecha Kucha abstracts will be available at EPICpeople.org to download, read, and search. Conference papers, Pecha Kucha presentations, keynotes, and tutorials were all videotaped and are now in production.
