## **MEET INCOMING PRESIDENT-ELECT: Cathleen Crain**

Cathleen Crain is a senior professional anthropologist and an active member of NAPA, AAA, and the Washington Association of Professional Anthropologists since the 1980s. She is one of the two founding partners in LTG Associates, Inc., the oldest anthropologically-based consulting firm in North America. She is also a professor (professional track) in the Department of Anthropology, University of Maryland, College Park. As a 35 year professional social scientist, Ms. Crain has worked with ethnic, vulnerable, and hard-to-reach populations domestically and internationally on issues of access, appropriateness, and quality of health and human services. Ms. Crain specializes in working with donor and policymaking organizations and connecting their priorities to those of the populations to be served.



Ms. Crain has designed, conducted, monitored, and evaluated policy and interventions on issues such as HIV/AIDS, intimate partner violence, childhood obesity and health, geriatric services, substance abuse, sexually transmitted diseases, tuberculosis, capacity building, and other topics. Ms. Crain has co-led LTG teams that have been recognized six times by the Praxis Awards for "outstanding achievement in translating anthropological knowledge into action."

Prior to the founding of LTG, Ms. Crain was director of refugee and immigrant-focused programs in the San Francisco Bay Area and New York. She directed a research and advocacy program in a large jail system and was core part of the treatment design team and the resident anthropologist/therapist for a regional alcohol treatment and education center. Ms. Crain holds a B.A. (Honors) and an M.A. from McMaster University in Canada.



### **NAPA-OT Field School Celebrating its 10th Anniversary Session!**

The NAPA-OT Field School Guatemala celebrates its tenth anniversary during the upcoming 2019 summer session. Our founding was spearheaded by anthropologist Gelya Frank and occupational therapist Nancie Furgang, with the goal of creating a transdisciplinary training opportunity across anthropology, occupational therapy, and global health. Our program focuses on health and occupation as human rights and explores the notion of social justice within the complex context of Guatemala. Over our ten years, we have developed a strong community-engaged model through which we develop research and practice projects for our student teams in close collaboration with our local partners in Antigua, Guatemala.



Our 2019 program will include projects on: 1) pediatric nutrition: social and occupational outcomes of undernourished children; 2) health provider perspectives: interrelationships of the public, private, and philanthropic sectors within the Guatemalan health system; and 3) surgical missions: critical humanitarianism.
