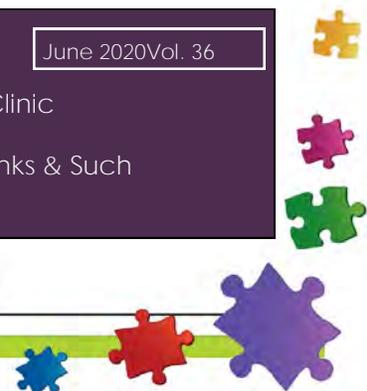
I hope summer presents opportunities for you to reflect, breathe, and rejuvenate – all essential components to staying safe, healthy and well.

Zoom Information Highlight

An Introduction to Virtual Options for FASD Assessment and Diagnosis

On May 21, 2020 the Rajani Clinic Training Project offered the first of two Zoom information sessions for FASD clinicians and coordinators on *Virtual Options for FASD Assessment and Diagnosis*. The second session was on June 11th, due to requests to offer the session for attendees across Canada, as well as those in Australia and New Zealand. These two countries use FASD diagnostic guidelines that are similar to our Canadian Guideline. Overall attendance from the two sessions was almost 300 individuals. This speaks in part to the necessity of options to deliver FASD assessment and diagnostic clinic processes as a result of the current pandemic situation. In May 2020, the Rajani Clinic Training Project had completed a one-year pilot project that saw six pediatric referrals to FASD clinics in rural Alberta complete the assessment and diagnostic clinic process using a virtual platform. This pilot was initiated prior to COVID 19, as clinics look for increased efficiencies, ways to deliver services to meet needs of individuals in remote, rural communities, and the necessity of having trained, experienced clinicians travel from urban regions to more remote areas to deliver services. As the articles below indicate, Canada is a global leader in live video conferencing, with more site networks developed over past years.

Feedback and surveys from those involved with the pilot project are essential, as well as from other clinics who are using virtual platforms to deliver assessment and diagnostic clinic processes. Your concerns and insight are valuable as we continually develop best practices, resources, TIPS sheets and training for all involved. Any new way of doing things is a shift and solutions-based process. Each clinic is unique in how they deliver services in their region, including: team composition, location of core clinicians; clinic schedules; budgets and managing wait lists. Changes in service delivery models due to COVID 19, as well as increased comfort levels using virtual platforms, will allow clinics to evaluate and assess options. This could **increase access to services, decrease travel from clients' home communities, and could increase case consult with team members and clinician time spent with caregivers and clients.** We understand there are challenges that will be specific to each clinic as they utilize new options and adapt to new technology. Hopefully, along with the challenges, there will be opportunity to discuss innovative practices that can increase success or adaptations .

Enviros Neurodevelopmental Assessment and Diagnostic Centre (NDC)

Welcome New Clinic Coordinator

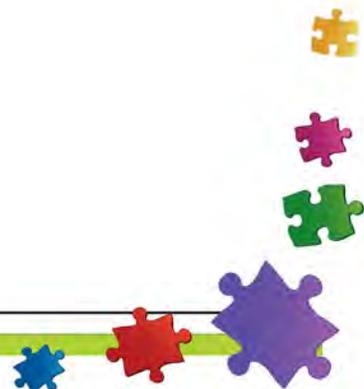
The health and safety of Enviros Neurodevelopmental Assessment & Diagnostic Centre (NDC) clients and team members is always our utmost priority. As such, for the month of April, NDC was on hiatus due to COVID restrictions. Now that strict precautions have been put into place, we have since reopened our centre and have been using telehealth to complete the psychologist's assessments; and in some cases, the caregiver interviews as well.

We've realized both benefits and challenges of using telehealth; we have found Zoom to be a great platform and simple to use and it's especially convenient for those last-minute assessments. Another positive we didn't anticipate, is that clients actually seem to feel more at ease as they don't feel "watched" while completing assessments. But, as a result of needing a 'helper' to support virtual assessments (i.e. sitting with clients during assessments) there are considerations for clinics, including time and hours away from other tasks when the support person is within the clinic agency. It is also important to have a safety plan in place when telehealth supports are alone with clients.

With that being said, as a result of the continued high demand of FASD assessments from the community, Enviros NDC has recently hired a second Coordinator. Thus, we would like to introduce Holly Jopling who has been hired to specifically focus on the section 34s (youth court ordered assessments) in Calgary. Holly was most recently employed as a High-Fidelity Wraparound Facilitator with Enviros. Prior to this previous role, Holly was a Youth Probation Officer and a Child Protection Social Worker for twelve years. During her time as a Youth Probation Officer, Holly supported Youth Forensics Psychiatric Services in the collection of information for Youth Criminal Justice Act Section 34 reports. She also participated in post-sentence planning with Youth Forensic Psychiatric Services and prepared Pre-Sentence Reports for the Youth Justice Court.

Holly has participated in numerous FASD trainings through the Asante Centre; and as a social worker, supported clients with FASD. Holly builds and maintains strong working relationships with colleagues, clients, and other stakeholders. She is an effective communicator and possesses excellent conflict resolution and crisis intervention skills. We are thrilled to have Holly as part of our dynamic team- along with Rita Spark, Dr. Brent Symes and Dr. Alexia Schneider.

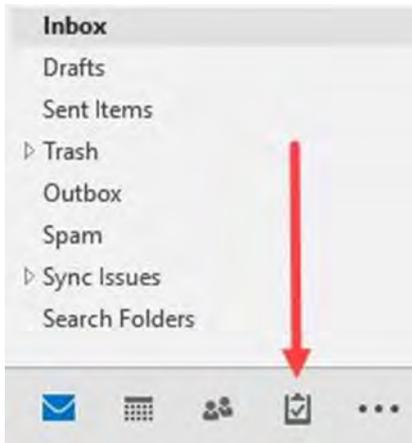

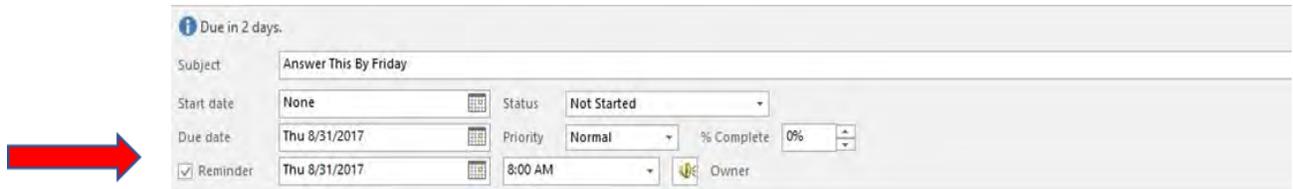
Set a reminder to an email

Create a reminder by adding emails to Outlook's task list:

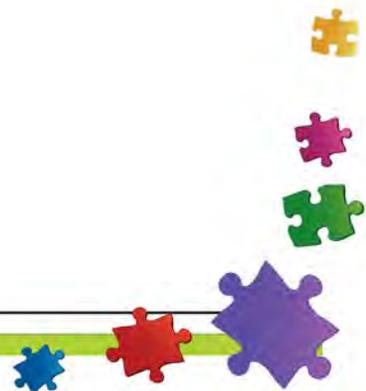
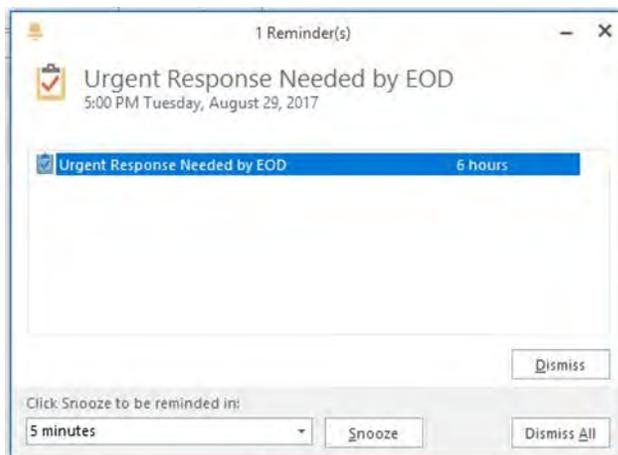
1. Drag the email and drop it on Outlook's task list icon. (The email will remain in the inbox)



2. Add a due date and set a date and time to receive a reminder. Save the task

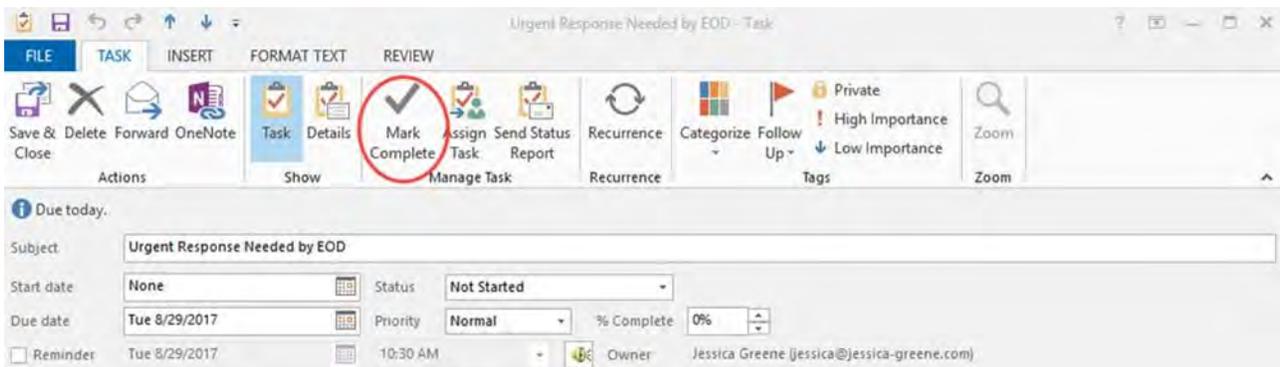


3. When you set a reminder, the task will pop up like a meeting reminder at the specified time.

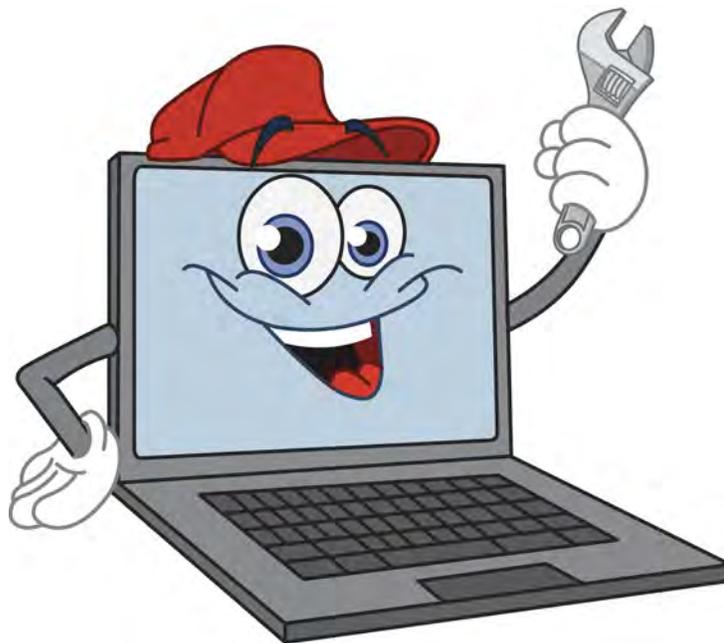

4. Once the task is complete, mark it as such to remove the task from your to-do list. Open the task by double-clicking it, and click the "Mark Complete" button—or just press the Insert key to quickly mark the item complete.



Outlook's task list is also useful if you're in the habit of copying yourself on emails as a reminder to follow up, or if you're emailing someone who is prone to ignoring your requests. Instead of keeping reminders as emails in your inbox, just move them to your to-do folder and add them to your task list.

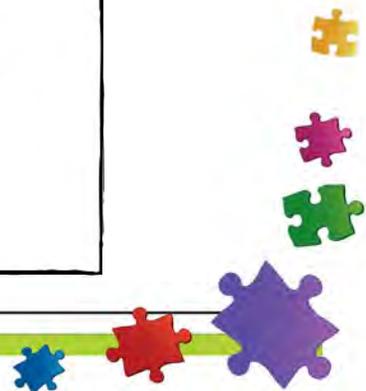

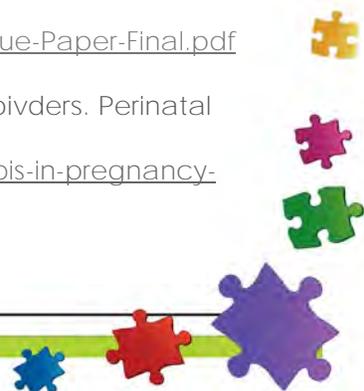
