This time she tells an entertaining mix of ghost, folk, and "cautionary" tales found in African, African-American, and Caribbean literature. The stories engage the audience in an entertaining and interactive style. Most importantly, the audience learns a moral or lesson from the stories. The program begins with Grandma entering and settling down to read. As she starts reading, she begins to hear noises and starts singing to ward off her fears. She tells the audience how her grandmother told her ghost stories and folk tales, all with a message, a moral, and a lesson to be learned. The program ends on a note of triumph that provides the audience, particularly children, with the knowledge that they can use positive thinking and action to overcome a bad situation. The show ends with a song in which everyone from the audience can participate by singing along.


